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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Independence Elementary School serves 839 students enrolled in Kindergarten through fifth grades. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 35% Hispanic and 65% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 78% White, 5% Black, 0% Native, 11% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 6% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Jeffrey Peters and Assistant Principa Dr. Tricia Travis. Independence Elementary School is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include News crew, Chess Club, Safety Patrols and Battle of the Books.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Independence Elementary School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2013 and the number of books per student is 9. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Independence Elementary School does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Hispanic students make up at least 35% of the school's population and continues to grow.
- The publication date of the collection is 2013, which is acceptable but can be improved upon.
- This collection contains many of the titles suggested by the DOE list and th enew B.E.S.T Standards suggested readings.
- The average reading level of 3.6 will help support and enrich students in K-3, but more complex texts will help enrich those in Grades 3-4.
- The collection is in need of more popular fiction, literature, graphic novels and non-fiction books (religion, philosophy and psychology), foreign language books with translations and an updated reference collection.
- The media center requires more books featuring LatinX characters and/or non-fiction texts with Hispanic role models with a focus in Music and Sports.
- Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project expectations as well as aged titles in fiction and/or nonfiction and overall age and appearance of the books.

- The average age of 2013 in the collection is acceptable, but can be improved upon.
- There are 1,117 additional e-books books and digital magazines available through SORA.
- There are 911 addition e-books and audio books available through Destiny.
- The average age of the literature can be updated to help support B.E.S.T Standards.

Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Independence Elementary School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

Summary

After completing a deeper, targeted analysis of the representation section of the TitleWise report, it was determined that:

- The media center requires more books featuring LatinX characters and/or non-fiction texts with Hispanic role models with a focus in Music and Sports.
- Many of our students read in their native language as well as emerging second language readers. This is a need in our collection.
- Hispanic students make up 35% of our school population, However we only have 8 titles written in their native language with an English translation.
